Secretary's Corner

I realized recently that as a writer for a homebrew club newsletter, I don't write much about home brewing in these monthly articles. The primary reason is that I don't brew as much as I used to and the beers I brew are things I like to drink and they aren't even special enough to enter into most competitions.


I'm a lucky guy who has a lot of things going on that permit me to travel a bit and when I do, I'm always trying to find out what is going on with local home brewers and I also incorporate new beers or old favorites that aren't obtainable here in Anchorage. I've watched the craft beer revolution grow in places like Texas, Pennsylvania, Spain, Italy, and, over the past few years, the southeast United States.

Doctor Fermento just wrote an Anchorage Press article about Nashville and it turned out that he and I were in that great town at the same time but we didn't hook up. He had asked me if I had any recommendations for good beer places and I mentioned one in particular and even sent him a photo of their tap list that I took a couple of years ago and haven't

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purged from my phone yet. He seemed to like the place from what he wrote but he also wrote that the beer scene in Tennessee is going strong overall.

He also mentioned Huntsville where I just spent a couple of days. His experience was getting stuck there and mine was seeing a couple of UAA hockey games at the great municipal arena where there are about eight beer stands selling - almost exclusively - craft beers and a liquor store with a bar and about 80 taps of craft beer from everywhere.



I'm off on another craft beer rant, but there is a reason for this. Most of those craft beers originated with a home brewer who decided to take a stab and see if the things he or she created were commercially viable. Since I - and a lot of other people - are buying them, these aspiring brewers got the result they were hoping for.

I can't think of a better example of a home brewer becoming successful than Ken Grossman of Sierra Nevada Brewing. I had the chance to tour the Sierra Nevada brewery in Chico several years ago. It was led by their - at the time -Chief Financial Officer, who I served with in the navy. The first thing we did was pick up a plastic cup and then we were off, seeing places that regular tour people don't get to see and drinking beer all the way into their beautiful restaurant where we sat at the bar and had a couple more. All of this is possible because a couple of guys made a pretty nice pale ale and decided to sell it.

This last trip to the southeast US was for the purpose of seeing the UAA hockey team play in Huntsville and spend a few days before the game in Nashville but plans changed when UAA announced that their women's basketball team was going to play Duke in an exhibition game at Cameron Indoor Stadium. Basketball geeks will understand why I altered our plans and made an eleven hour drive from Nashville to Durham, NC; the chance to see a legendary building and cross a bucket list item off of my personal list.

This wasn't really too far out of my way as I had also planned to spend a few

days in Asheville, NC, a town I'd visited briefly many years ago and wanted to see again. Of course, since I was in the area, an 18 mile

drive to Sierra Nevada's new brewery there had to be done and I highly recommend everyone else do the same if you are ever in the area. The brewery is a spectacular building at the end of a winding forested road with rock walls and rock street lamp bases, wild turkeys walking around and is practically at the of the runway of Asheville's airport.

My sons and I have a tradition; the first one of us to spot Sierra Nevada's Celebration Ale anywhere, will immediately inform the rest of us where they found it. Last year I was in Oregon and got to send the message and this year my oldest son was in California a few days before I left on my trip and he texted the photo of a display somewhere while he out touring breweries and California's immense liquor stores. I really like Celebration but have to say that the fresh draft from the Asheville brewery has me wondering if - like Guinness in Ireland - the regular stuff available here will be as pleasurable as in the past. really going to work hard on figuring this out just as soon as I spot Celebration on sale here.

The Sierra Nevada brewery is not the only good thing about Asheville. Having been to the beer playground of Bend, Oregon I was surprised to feel the same vibe in Asheville. When we checked into our hotel the desk clerk told me that Asheville Brewing Company is located in the building where her father ran an auto body shop for

many years. She said it was bizarre going in there and seeing bright tanks where the frame straightener was and a beer garden where cars were detailed.

> I stopped at Hops & Vines, a home brew supply shop where owner David Pottharst said business is growing fast. He said he's finding people brewing more advanced beer these days and said it is because of the craft breweries showing how crazy you can get with it. In addition to the nice supply of brewing supplies he has four taps of commercial beer on line as it is permissible for him to sell them in a homebrew store in that state. You would think that the bible belt would be an area where this was frowned upon but, apparently, bible belters like their beer and like to buy it wherever they go.

I don't know how many breweries and/or brewpubs there are in Asheville but the owner of that home brew supply shop said that, by the end of this year, there will be five of them on

his street alone. There is also the trendy "South Slope" area of town where there are a lot of people looking for good beer if the crowds of people we ran into on weekday afternoons is an indication. And one of the coolest things is that nearly every one of the breweries list the ingredients of their beers and I didn't find one where someone with knowledge of the recipes didn't have time to talk to me about them.

So, thinking about craft beer and home brewing; I'm sitting here right now drinking a clone of a Sierra Nevada Pale Ale and had a Bell's IPA clone before that. As I said, I'm not much of an adventurer when I brew but one of the things that helps when I'm out surfing for good craft beer is trying to find things I like. I hated Saisons until I made myself drink a few good ones. Now I have some of them in my home brew stash.

So, how adventurous would I have to be to try to match the amazing "12 Grain With Bret" from Bhramari Brewing? This one had quinoa, spelt, farro, wheat, oats, barley, rye, corn, purple sticky rice,

buckwheat, and sorghum (I know-that's only eleven) that my palate couldn't differentiate among but it was an incredible beer. Maybe it had to do with the citra, blanc, and Idaho 7 hops that they recovered from a barrel aged IPA and dry hopped it with and I hope I run into the GNBC member who brings one of his or her own to a meeting.

I see craft beers as simply ideas that can come full circle if we think of a brewer as a comrade in malt who does something crazy and tells us how he or she did it. Some people who have pushed limits have inspired others to do the same and then someone else pushes the limit again and we find out if there are any limits. I hope there aren't.

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
2017 Humpy's Big Fish Competition

examples, is that if the Competition winner is a five year old, oak aged, smoked gruit, this might be the best beer, but one that might not fit the schedule at Midnight



Humpy's Great Alaskan Alehouse is once again hosting the GNBC. We are yet to be sure the exact room we will be sitting in, but I will have that information ready for the December newsletter.

The judging will take place on December 2. Tasting will begin promptly at 10 am.

Qualified judges! Please put December 2nd on your calendar. We all know that Humpy's takes good care of us. This judging event can be one of the best of the year. 
