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Left Hand Brewing Company's Eric Wallace

J zon Eric Wallace is the President and co-founder of Indian Peaks Brewing Company, parent company of Left Hand Brewing Company. Eric grew up around the world as the son of an Air Force officer, and was exposed to good beer at a precocious age in Germany. He graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1984 with a degree in international affairs, and spent 8 years in the Air Force as a communications officer in Italy and Turkey before moving back to the U.S. in 1993. Upon his return, he was inspired by the renaissance in craft brewing developing here in the U.S. and, along with co-



founder Dick Doore, decided to jump headfirst into the craft beer business.

On the personal side, Eric has been married to his wife, Cinzia, since 1991 and has three beautiful children, Noami, Noel and Nick. He's an avid foodie, loves good espresso, and seeks out the weird and unusual beers that are being produced in this country, and will even tell you that the US is the most

interesting and creative craft brewing scene in the world today. Once you spend time with him, you'll know he's passionate about beer and food pairings – he's a supporting member of the Slow Food movement, and even his business card says "Beer is Food." He's enjoyed working with top restaurants around the country, putting on close to 100 different beer dinners to a range of audiences, from the novice to the beer geek and all others in between. Whether its over a Black Jack Porter, an espresso, or a bowl of pasta in all its myriad diversities, you'll enjoy your time with Eric.

One of Eric's other passions is giving back to our local communities where he works, lives and plays. He serves on the Imagine! Foundation Board of Directors, the Colorado Shakespeare Festival Advisory Board, and is the Vice President of the Colorado Brewers Guild.

Eric has been a supporting member of the Slow Food movement since the late 90's.

Slow Food is a nonprofit, eco-gastronomic member-supported organization that was founded in 1989 to counteract fast food and fast life, the disappearance of local food traditions and people's dwindling




interest in the food they eat, where it comes from, how it tastes and how our food choices affect the rest of the world.


