With a few hundred entries expected in the Northwest Region (that is our region, for the geographically challenged), we will need all the help we can get. We have more BJCP judges in our club than the number of people that even showed up to judge in the Northwest in the last few year. This is shaping up to take both a Saturday and a Sunday to complete the judging, but as not everyone will be able to make both days, the more volunteers the better. If you have friends that appreciate good beer (the entrants generally only send their best on to Nationals...) invite them along as well. Jason Ditsworth is the judging coordinator, so be sure to contact him with yor info so he can set you up on a judging panel for the event. No need to be a BJCP certified judge, but we will make sure to pair you with experienced judges if you are new to evaluating beers.



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
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During the March meeting, Jason will be giving an educational talk on what to think about and what comment are helpful on a beer/mead/cider score sheets. You can then use that new found talent to come and help judge at the 2008 Snow Goose Breakup Home Brew Competition on Saturday March 22. Entries will be accepted at the Sleeping Lady Brewery on Friday the 21st (First day of SPRING) form noon to 6pm. Judging will start at 10:30am on Saturday, so follow the signs to the judging room, and show up a little early to get signed in and put on a panel. The winning brew will be enjoyed out on the deck in the summer season, so bring out the best you have, and come help judge!

Well, that's it again for this month. I'll see you at the meeting on the 19th! Enjoy your Beers, Meads, and Ciders responsibly this month and remember to stay safe out there.

This year's competition was a difficult one, as there were so many fabulous beers! The Best of Show winners were Rory Petrik with a Belgian Tripel and Dennis Urban with his Cabernet Sauvignon and Basswood Honey Pyment. Congratulations to them both and all those who won ribbons!

The Snow Goose Break-up competition will be on the 22^{nd} of March with entries being taken at the Goose on Friday the 21^{st} of March. Good luck to all of you who enter! The beer trip to Kenai will be from the $28^{th}-30^{th}$ of March. The bus plans to leave Anchorage around 12:00 noon on Friday. There is still room for anyone that still wants to attend. Get a hold of Keri Canepa for reservations and details.

There will be a fall competition in lieu of the State Fair competition, sometime in late August. Ken and Shaunna Pajak have generously offered to host the judging at Café Amsterdam. Volunteers to organize the event are needed so contact Ira Edwards if anyone is interested.

The GNBC will be hosting the first round of Nationals this year. In the past the event has been split between Portland and Seattle over a 2 week period. Last year Seattle only got 12 judges to show up. Of those that showed, the majority were novice judges who had very little experience. Alaska has more BJCP certified judges than the whole Pacific Northwest combined, so we should be able to handle it with ease. Steve Schmitt will be handling all of the ticky details but needs volunteers in every capacity, so if you can help out please contact him. The first round of Nationals anticipates approximately 500 entries from Alaska, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Wyoming, and Montana. The GNBC will be handling the competition over a two day consecutive period, broken up into 2 sessions per day. If you are interested in judging either or both of the days, please contact Jason Dittsworth. He is working on a judging schedule so the sooner the better.

If you are entering, please remember to reserve 4 bottles of beer. You need one for the first round and if you place 1st, 2nd, or 3rd, will need an additional 3 bottles for the second round.



A friend and fellow brewer Rodger Bowman passed away on Sunday the 17th of February from Mesothelioma. He was from Australia and will be laid to rest there. Let us all bow our heads and raise a pint in remembrance to him.

The education portion of our meeting was a talk given by Ira Edwards on Lambics. He and Chris Anderson started the project 5 years ago. They ordered a bunch of lambics from thebelgianshop.com and cultivated the active yeast. The Belgian Shop offers a lot of beers that you can't get here in the states and are unpasteurized and as fresh as you can get them. They also purchased all the commercial yeast they could find here and made a big slurry. Ira and Chris accomplished brewing 150 gallons in one long day. And you thought that your brew day was long! Now they are reaping the benefits of all their labors with some award winning beers. Ira brought in a Geuze, which placed 2nd at Nationals, a Kreik, Framboise, and Cassis. He also brought to share some strawberry, apricot, peach, and a Muscat grape lambics. Jason said that what we were drinking were world class lambics and I must concur.....they were phenomenal! Way to go Ira and Chris.



More importantly – don't expect anyone at the Goose to help you with your entries – they are simply going to accept the bottle. 

To get ready for the judging we'll be covering beer judging as the educational topic at the March meeting. If you find yourself saying why is judging an educational topic? Well the answer is pretty simple, the best way to go from making okay beer to making great beer is to understand how to evaluate and fix what you are doing wrong. This is exactly what we strive to do when judging beers at our competitions. Topics that will be covered include:

1) A summary of how this competition will be different than our other competitions

2) A brief history of how we have earned the honor of running this competition (and why it's a little extra important that we do a good job)

3) An overview of the BJCP style guidelines

4) An overview of the BJCP score sheets and suggestions for "practicing"- have you ever in your life heard of such an easy homework assignment?

5) An overview of what you should and should not write on the score sheets

6) Maybe we'll even judge a beer as a group?

I hope all of you that plan to judge on April 12 and/or 13 can make it to the March meeting. If you want to judge and haven't signed up yet pleas send me an email at ditsworth@greatnorthernbrewers.org. Please include with your message what day(s) you can judge and whether you prefer to judge the morning session (10:00 AM) or the afternoon session (1:30 or 2:00 PM), OR both. If you plan to judge and you also plan to enter the competition please let me know what categories you will be entering. I need this information to setup the judging panels.
